### PENETRATING OILS COMPARED

Machinist's Workshop magazine actually tested penetrates for break out torque on rusted nuts. With significant results! They arranged a subjective test of all the popular penetrates with the control being the torque required to remove the nut from a "scientifically rusted" environment.

None	516 pounds
WD-40	238 pounds
PB Blaster	214 pounds
Liquid Wrench	127 pounds
Kano Kroil	106 pounds
ATF-Acetone mix	53 pounds

The ATF-Acetone mix was a "home brew" mix of 50-50 automatic transmission fluid and acetone.

Note: The "home brew" was better than any commercial product in this particular test. A local machinist group mixed up a batch and now all use it with equally good results. Also note, that "liquid Wrench" is about as effective as "Kroil" for about 20% of the price.
