
The Pan-American Hwy passes through 14 countries and is a length of 48,000 kilometres or 29,825.817 miles.


There are four officer positions opening for the 2025 calendar year. They are President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer/Membership.

A Little History About Gas Pumps (More about Gasoline)




When the automobile was first taking off, gas pumps as we know them today didn't exist. In fact, the very first motor vehicles were powered not by gasoline, but rather by steam, electricity, or in some cases, kerosene. In the early days of oil drilling in the mid-1800s, when the first gas-powered cars were still decades away, oil companies were after kerosene for lamp fuel. Gasoline was just a byproduct of creating kerosene, and was often burned or discarded. The predecessor to the gas pump wasn't designed for cars; the first one was <u>installed</u> in a grocery store in 1885 to measure and dispense kerosene for lamps.

In the 1890s, car inventors realized gasoline made great motor fuel, and what was once disposable suddenly became valuable. In the early days of gas-powered vehicles, there weren't any gas stations to dispense the fuel, so customers bought gasoline the same way they bought kerosene: in a can at the pharmacy, blacksmith shop, or grocery store.

Although its inventor, Sylvanus Freelove Bowser, didn't anticipate it at the time, the pump originally designed for kerosene ended up being extraordinarily useful for filling cars with gasoline. In 1905, Bowser added a long hose to one of his pumps so motorists could fill up curbside. While there's some disagreement on what the very first gas station was, the first drive-up service station is usually cited as the Gulf Refining Company pump that opened in downtown Pittsburgh in 1913. - Ed

Old Business

Jack noted several activities in which club members had participated this quarter.

Several cars and individuals attended the annual car show sponsored by the Southern British Car Club in Ootlewah, Tennessee. The reports were that it was a great show, in a unique setting. Those who attended encouraged others to make this show a part of their fall schedule in October 2025.

Other members attended the Nashville Car Club event and reported similar enthusiasm. Meri Leedy's Jaguar XKE took the excursion and did well in the judging. With a minor glitch of needing to add fuel, both she and the car returned to Crossville safely.

On a beautiful, warm September day, several members of the club ventured from Crossville to Sparta for an enjoyable lunch at Marioochi's Italian Restaurant. The pizza and service were amazing and all who attended were grateful to Edna and Alex for the recommendation.

Treasurer's Report

Edna Horony, PBCC club treasurer, noted that the club treasury stands at \$1313.37. She also stated that she has one last ball cap available (sold at the meeting), and a prototype of embroidered club tee shirts. At least eight members expressed interest in a Polo type of shirt and Edna will get a price and commitment to purchase these to sell at a future meeting.

Dennis Rainey noted that the treasury seems to be strong enough to consider the option of beginning to contribute to a local charity. This may be discussed at future meetings.

New Business

A member announced an upcoming event to be held in Clark Range. While this gathering is not specifically for British cars, it is a fun gathering at the Country Store there on October19 this year. Members were encouraged to make the short drive to this casual event, 10:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. that day.

One topic explored during the meeting was the idea of expanding our membership to include British bikes and other European cars. While we would not change our name or primary focus, this could potentially broaden our base and enhance participation. Our car show at Rugby already accommodates these vehicles, making this a consideration. The idea of advertising on the Facebook page of the 'Crossville Critter Chatter' to spread the word about our club and potential expansion was introduced.

Membership also discussed the concept of 'tech days', where members could gather informally with mentors to learn about maintenance and repair tasks. This could extend to assisting members who may struggle with basic services like oil changes or brake work. Additionally, the group entertained the idea of a club project car, which we could refurbish and sell for charity. This initiative could help members gain hands-on experience while fostering camaraderie. Meri Leedy offered her garage for tech activities.

Planning begins now for the 2024 Christmas gathering. Several members made suggestions for locations and menu options. The group seemed to agree that Buzz Merchlewitz's offer to host at the Garden RV Community Clubhouse was a welcome option. Due to scheduling there and the needs of the members, the consensus was determined to plan the event for December 7, 2024. Edna and Pat will investigate caterers for this event. Members should save that date, beginning at about 6:30 p.m. As plans develop, more specific notices will be distributed to all club members. As in the past, members want to continue to collect items for the local 'Toys for Tots' benefit at the holiday dinner.

Nominations for next year's PBCC Club officers will be solicited via email between now and the first meeting of 2025, in January.

Jack then asked for a motion for the meeting to adjourn, to which the membership agreed and unanimously passed.
