Points Versus Electronic Ignition

... It's an age-old debate in the classic car community, and if you ask ten people, you'll most likely get eleven answers on which is better. Fitting electronic ignition to your classic car comes with a lot of perks and I've listed them below. Here are five reasons why you might consider swapping your points out and one reason for not installing an electronic ignition kit:

1. Low maintenance - no tuning or adjusting, fit & forget!

First and foremost, these kits are very low maintenance, so say goodbye to messing around with points and condensers. Once installed, you can drive along knowing your timing is going to stay absolutely spot on, and your ignition system will be performing its best, with no need for tuning or adjusting. With no mechanical parts to wear, these conversion kits deliver consistent and reliable spark timing. You won't have to worry about leaning over your engine bay every few months resetting the points gap, or standing on the side of the road replacing burnt out points. Converting your distributor to electronic is as

easy as changing a set of points, which is why these kits are 'fit and forget'!

2. Stronger spark – more efficient, better starting, smoother idle!

Increasing your spark energy will give you several noticeable benefits. First, you can use a leaner fuel mixture, which makes your fuel go further and improves the overall efficiency of the engine. It also helps with starting, so if your vehicle can be tricky to start at times, going electronic may save you from getting stranded. You'll also notice a much smoother and more seamless idle, so your classic will tick over smoothly.

If you're wondering why you get a stronger spark from these electronic ignition systems, there are a few reasons. Now that the switching is done electronically, you will get much less energy loss than with mechanical points. The time it takes for mechanical points to open and close means some of your spark energy gets wasted. As well as that, upgrading to our system means getting rid of any arcing that was happening across the points. Electronically controlled switching means that switching happens quickly and precisely, with very little energy wasted.

3. Intelligent dwell for precise spark timing!

These kits are designed with adaptive or 'intelligent' dwell. Adaptive dwell helps maintain peak performance across the full range of RPMs by adjusting the dwell time of the coil. This can help reduce misfires and improve your engine's overall performance.

In traditional points systems, the dwell time decreases as the RPMs increase because the dwell angle is fixed. As a result, the time available for the coil to charge reduces as the engine speed increases, which gives you a weaker spark when you need it the most. Dwell would also change as the points wear, so your timing would gradually get less accurate, meaning constant adjustment is necessary.

The adaptive electronic system maintains a relatively constant dwell time at lower RPMs to maximize the time for which the coil is being energized. It then optimally adjusts the dwell in the higher RPMs to give you the strongest possible spark.

4. Durable, resistant to harsh environments, no moving parts!

Another great thing about electronic ignition is its durability. For instance, these electronic kits and distributors can handle all the harsh conditions of an engine bay, and they can operate in a wide range of climates. Your classic's timing and overall performance won't be affected by heat, cold, or engine vibration. It will carry on running smoothly even when conditions are against you.

And, with no moving mechanical parts making contact with each other and wearing themselves out, there is no life expectancy on our kits. Once you've installed the kit and timed it up, you won't have to worry about it again.

5. Maintain original look!

Many classic car enthusiasts prefer the old to the new, but ask yourself this, what if you can have it both ways? Electronic

ignition kits are designed to fit inside your distributor, making them virtually invisible from the outside. No big external boxes or complex wiring, they have two simple wires that come from the distributor and go to either side of the coil. Positive earth vehicles are wired slightly differently, but, there are have kits for those too. The simple beauty of electronic ignitions remains the same and will keep your car looking like it just drove out of the factory, so if you are considering a subtle yet reliable and effective electronic ignition solution, this may be the way to go for you.

One reason to keep the old point system!

As I mentioned above, there is at least one reason for keeping your points system of ignition. The electronic system doesn't often fail. It is a rare event. But, when they do it is a catastrophic failure, meaning that there is no warning and it is complete with no hope of a quick repair. However, if you chose to go the electronic route, there is a simple and easy solution to a roadside failure. Many enthusiasts who use the electronic system in the past, as I have in my MGB for approximately fifteen trouble free years, carry with them in their parts stash, a preset set of points which can easily be installed on the road side and you are on your way again.
